21 This Consent Order is entered into between the Commissioner of Financial Protection and
22 Innovation (Complainant or Commissioner) and Respondent Capital Alliance Group (Respondent)
23 and is made with respect to the following facts:

24 **I.**

25 **RECITALS**

26 A. The Commissioner has jurisdiction over the licensing and regulation of persons and
27 entities engaged in the business of finance lending or brokering under the California Financing Law
28 (CFL) (Fin. Code, § 22000 et seq.).

1 B. Respondent is a corporation, with a principal place of business at 2400 East Katella
2 Avenue, Suite 800, Anaheim, California, 92806.

3 C. Respondent is licensed as a finance lender and broker under the CFL with main
4 license number 603I782.

5 D. Respondent operates no branch offices in California.

6 E. In accordance with Financial Code section 22159, CFL licensees must file an annual
7 report with the Commissioner by March 15 of each year (Annual Report).

8 F. On January 5, 2022, the Commissioner again notified CFL licensees of the March 15,
9 2022 deadline to file their annual reports by sending notice to the email address each CFL licensee
10 must establish for communications from the Commissioner (designated email address) pursuant to
11 the Commissioner’s Order on Electronic Communications, dated November 22, 2013. The
12 notification again warned that the Commissioner could assess monetary penalties for untimely filing
13 or failing to file pursuant to Financial Code section 22715(b).

14 G. On February 17, 2022, the Commissioner again notified CFL licensees of the March
15 15, 2022 deadline to file their annual reports by sending notice to the email address each CFL
16 licensee established pursuant to the Commissioner’s Order on Electronic Communications, dated
17 November 22, 2013. The notification warned that the Commissioner could assess penalties and
18 summarily revoke licenses for untimely filing or failing to file pursuant to Financial Code section
19 22715.

20 H. On March 2, 2022, the Commissioner again notified CFL licensees of the March 15,
21 2022 deadline to file their annual reports by sending notice to the email address each CFL licensee
22 established pursuant to the Commissioner’s Order on Electronic Communications, dated November
23 22, 2013. The notification warned that the Commissioner could assess penalties and summarily
24 revoke licenses for untimely filing or failing to file pursuant to Financial Code section 22715.

25 I. As of March 15, 2022, Respondent had not filed its Annual Report with the
26 Commissioner. As a result, the Commissioner issued a notice on March 18, 2022 to Respondent to
27 Respondent’s email address established pursuant to the Commissioner’s Order on Electronic
28 Communications, dated November 22, 2013, advising Respondent that it should file its annual report

1 by or before March 30, 2022 or else its license would be summarily revoked pursuant to Financial
2 Code section 22715 (Notice email).

3 J. As of March 30, 2022, Respondent had not filed its Annual Report with the
4 Commissioner as directed in the Notice Letter. As a result, on April 19, 2022, the Commissioner
5 issued an Order Summarily Revoking California Finance Lenders License and/or Broker license
6 pursuant to Financial Code Section 22715 for CFL License Number 603I782 (Summary Revocation
7 Order).

8 K. Upon receiving the Summary Revocation Order(s), Respondent timely notified the
9 Commissioner that Respondent was requesting a hearing on the Summary Revocation Order(s).

10 L. On April 27, 2021, Respondent submitted its Annual Report, which was due on
11 March 15, 2022, 30 business days late. Pursuant to Financial Code Section 22715, the maximum
12 penalty that may be imposed for filing 30 business days late is \$13,000.00 (\$100 per business day
13 for the first five business days and \$500 per business day thereafter up to a maximum of \$25,000).

14 M. In connection with these proceedings, Respondent represented to the Commissioner
15 that it had taken no new applications under its license.

16 N. The Commissioner finds that entering into this Consent Order is in the public interest
17 and consistent with the purposes fairly intended by the policies and provisions of the CFL.

18 NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, and the terms and conditions set
19 forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

20 **II.**

21 **TERMS AND CONDITIONS**

22 1. Purpose. The parties intend to resolve this matter for the purpose of judicial economy
23 and expediency and without the uncertainty and expense of a hearing or other litigation.

24 2. Order Rescinding Revocation Order. The Commissioner hereby rescinds the
25 Summary Revocation Order which had been issued on April 19, 2022 (Summary Revocation Order).

26 3. Administrative Penalty. Respondent shall pay an administrative penalty of \$7,000.00
27 no later than 30 days after the effective date of this Consent Order as defined in paragraph 27. The
28 penalty must be made payable in the form of a cashier's check or Automated Clearing House deposit

1 to the Department of Financial Protection and Innovation and transmitted to the attention of
2 Accounting – Litigation, Department of Financial Protection and Innovation, 2101 Arena Boulevard,
3 Sacramento, California 95834. Notice of the payment must be concurrently sent to Jari Binder,
4 Counsel, Department of Financial Protection and Innovation, One Sansome Street, Suite 600, San
5 Francisco, California 94104.

6 4. Failure to Pay Administrative Penalty. If Respondent fails to comply with paragraph
7 3, the Commissioner may summarily suspend Respondent from engaging in business under its
8 license until it provides evidence of compliance to the Commissioner’s satisfaction. Respondent
9 hereby waives any notice or hearing rights afforded under the Administrative Procedure Act,
10 including Government Code section 11415.60, subdivision (b); Code of Civil Procedure; or any
11 other provision of law to contest the summary suspension contemplated by this paragraph.

12 5. Transition to Nationwide Multistate Licensing System (NMLS). Respondent shall
13 submit a license transition request through NMLS by filing a Company Form (MU1) and an
14 Individual Form (MU2) for each control person no later than 30 days after the effective date of this
15 Consent Order as defined in paragraph 27. Respondent understands and agrees that it shall disclose
16 all up-to-date required information on its MU1 and MU2.

17 6. Failure to Transition to NMLS. If Respondent fails to comply with paragraph 5, the
18 Commissioner may summarily suspend/revoke Respondent from engaging in business under its
19 license until it provides evidence of compliance to the Commissioner’s satisfaction. Respondent
20 hereby waives any notice or hearing rights afforded under the Administrative Procedure Act,
21 including Government Code section 11415.60, subdivision (b); Code of Civil Procedure; or any
22 other provision of law to contest the summary suspension/revocation contemplated by this
23 paragraph.

24 7. Waiver of Hearing Rights. Respondent acknowledges the Commissioner is ready,
25 willing, and able to proceed with a hearing on the Summary Revocation Order on the charges
26 contained in this Consent Order. Respondent hereby waives the right to any hearings, and to any
27 reconsideration, appeal, or other right to review which may be afforded pursuant to the CFL, the
28 California Administrative Procedure Act, the California Code of Civil Procedure, or any other

1 provision of law. Respondent further expressly waives any requirement for the filing of an
2 Accusation pursuant to Government section 11415.60, subdivision (b). By waiving such rights,
3 Respondent effectively consents to this Consent Order and the Order Rescinding the Revocation
4 Order becoming final.

5 8. Full and Final Resolution. The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that this
6 Consent Order is intended to constitute a full and final resolution of the violations described herein,
7 and that no further proceedings or actions will be brought by the Commissioner in connection with
8 these matters except under the CFL or any other provision of law, or excepting therefrom any
9 proceeding to enforce compliance with the terms of this Consent Order.

10 9. Failure to Comply with Consent Order. Respondent agrees that if it fails to comply
11 with the terms of this Consent Order, the Commissioner may, in addition to all other available
12 remedies it may invoke under the CFL, summarily suspend/revoke the CFL license of Respondent
13 until Respondent is in compliance. Respondent waives any notice and hearing rights to contest such
14 summary suspensions/revocations which may be afforded under the CFL, the California
15 Administrative Procedure Act, the California Code of Civil Procedure, or any other provision of law
16 in connection therewith.

17 10. Information Willfully Withheld or Misrepresented. This Consent Order may be
18 revoked, and the Commissioner may pursue any and all remedies available under law against
19 Respondent if the Commissioner discovers that Respondent knowingly or willfully withheld or
20 misrepresented information used for and relied upon in this Consent Order.

21 11. Future Actions by Commissioner. If Respondent fails to comply with the terms of the
22 Consent Order, the Commissioner may institute proceedings for any and all violations otherwise
23 resolved under this Consent Order. The Commissioner reserves the right to bring any future actions
24 against Respondent, or any of its partners, owners, officers, shareholders, directors, employees or
25 successors for any and all unknown violations of this CFL.

26 12. Assisting Other Agencies. Nothing in this Consent Order limits the

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1 Commissioner’s ability to assist any other government agency (city, county, state or federal) with
2 any prosecution, administrative, civil or criminal action brought by that agency against Respondent
3 or any other person based on any of the activities alleged in this matter or otherwise.

4 13. No Presumption Against Drafter. Each party acknowledges that it has had the
5 opportunity to draft, review, and edit the language of this Consent Order. Accordingly, the parties
6 intend no presumption for or against the drafting party will apply in construing any part of this
7 Consent Order. The parties waive the benefit of Civil Code section 1654 as amended or
8 corresponding provisions of any successor statute, which provide that in cases of uncertainty,
9 language of a contract should be interpreted most strongly against the party who caused the
10 uncertainty to exist.

11 14. Independent Legal Advice. Each of the parties represents, warrants, and agrees that it
12 has had the opportunity to receive independent advice from an attorney(s) and/or representatives
13 with respect to the advisability of executing this Consent Order.

14 15. Headings. The headings to the paragraphs of this Consent Order are inserted for
15 convenience only and will not be deemed a part hereof or affect the construction or interpretation of
16 the provisions hereof.

17 16. Binding. This Consent Order is binding on all heirs, assigns, and/or successors in
18 interest.

19 17. Reliance. Each of the parties represents, warrants, and agrees that in executing this
20 Consent Order, it has relied solely on the statements set forth herein and the advice of its own legal
21 counsel, if represented. Each of the parties further represents, warrants, and agrees that in executing
22 this Consent Order it has placed no reliance on any statement, representation, or promise of any
23 other party, or any other person or entity not expressly set forth herein, or upon the failure of any
24 party or any other person or entity to make any statement, representation, or disclosure of anything
25 whatsoever. The parties have included this clause: (1) to preclude any claim that any party was in
26 any way fraudulently induced to execute this Consent Order; and (2) to preclude the introduction of
27 parol evidence to vary, interpret, supplement, or contradict the terms of this Consent Order.

28 18. Waiver, Amendments, and Modifications. No waiver, amendment, or modification of

1 this Consent Order will be valid or binding unless it is in writing and signed by each of the parties.
2 The waiver of any provision of this Consent Order will not be deemed a waiver of any other
3 provision. No waiver by either party of any breach of, or of compliance with, any condition or
4 provision of this Consent Order by the other party will be considered a waiver of any other condition
5 or provision or of the same condition or provision at another time.

6 19. Full Integration. This Consent Order is the final written expression and the complete
7 and exclusive statement of all the agreements, conditions, promises, representations, and covenants
8 between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior or
9 contemporaneous agreements, negotiations, representations, understandings, and discussions
10 between and among the parties, their respective representatives, and any other person or entity, with
11 respect to the subject matter covered hereby.

12 20. Governing Law. This Consent Order will be governed by and construed in
13 accordance with California law. Each of the parties hereto consents to the jurisdiction of such court
14 and thereby irrevocably waives, to the fullest extent permitted by law, the defense of an inconvenient
15 forum to the maintenance of such action or proceeding in such court.

16 21. Counterparts. This Consent Order may be executed in one or more separate
17 counterparts, each of which when so executed, shall be deemed an original. Such counterparts shall
18 together constitute a single document.

19 22. Effect Upon Future Proceedings. If Respondent applies for any license, permit or
20 qualification under the Commissioner’s current jurisdiction, or are the subject of any future action by
21 the Commissioner to enforce this Consent Order, then the subject matter hereof shall be admitted for
22 the purpose of such application(s) or enforcement proceeding(s).

23 23. Voluntary Agreement. Respondent hereby enters into this Consent Order voluntarily
24 and without coercion and acknowledges that no promises, threats, or assurances have been made by
25 the Commissioner or any officer, or agent thereof, about this Consent Order. The parties each
26 represent and acknowledge that he, she or it is executing this Consent Order completely voluntarily
27 and without any duress or undue influence of any kind from any source.

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1 24. Notice. Any notice required under this Consent Order shall be provided to each party

14 27. Effective Date. This Consent Order shall become final and effective when signed by
15 all parties and delivered by the Commissioner’s agent via e-mail to Respondent at the following
16 email address: narin@capitalalliance.com.

17 28. Authority to Sign. Each signatory hereto covenants that he/she possesses all
18 necessary capacity and authority to sign and enter into this Consent Order and undertake the
19 obligations set forth herein.
